The area behind this has been a little problematic as it in shade with thin soil. We've planted shade tolerant hostas, cranesbill, succulents and wild strawberries whilst encouraging some spring flowers for the early bees.



 We've included perennials and different annuals this year in our planters to extend the flowering period.

We have introduced staged mowing to some of the verges and seeded with red and white clover. These verges will take some time to establish, and we have added signs to explain this. We make sure that there is clear vision for road and pavement users. The verges will be cut back, and the thatch removed in September.
