Pilling Parish Council

The Role of Pilling Parish Council

There are three tiers of local government with areas of responsibility in Pilling:

- Lancashire County Council
- Wyre Borough Council
- Pilling Parish Council

What is a Parish or Town Council?

'Parish and town councils are the foundation of local government. They are the level of government closest to the people and have a vital role to play in improving local quality of life. They can influence decisions that affect local people, help bring life to local communities and offer a way of making sure services meet the needs of residents'. Parish and Town Council Charter in November 2008

Parish councils were formed in 1894 and are the smallest area of civil administration in England. They are the level of local government closest to the people. Councillors serve for a maximum period of four years.

Parish & Town Councils Role in the Community?

Parish councils have a wide range of duties and powers. A council may resolve to call itself a town council if it so wishes. Councils must be given the power by law before they can act. They are led by the chairman and advised by the clerk. Meetings are open to the public. Time is allowed for residents to give their views and ask questions. Meetings are held mostly in the evening. A good council listens to its electors and represents their views. It also works in partnership with other authorities and various organisations to bring benefit to the parish/town. Councillors must sign a declaration of acceptance of office upon election and must agree to the Code of Conduct before they may act as a councillor. Money for projects is raised from local taxation (precept) and from grants. That money is spent wholly within the parish/town and will add value to the services provided by the principal authorities.

Pilling Parish Council

Ten local people serve as Councillors on the Parish Council. They are all volunteers and receive no pay for the work they do on behalf of the Parish. Elections to serve as a Parish Councillor are held every four years, unless there is a resignation when the casual vacancy is advertised on the notice boards and the Parish Newsletter.

An important part of the role of the Parish Council is to represent the views of the Parish in response to various public consultations.

Your Council Tax Bill

It is this time each year all Council's set their budgets for the next financial year, starting April, 2023. Your Council Tax bill includes Pilling Parish Council's precept amount, the Parish Council uses this money to carry out the duties and responsibilities in our Parish. The Parish Council also receives income from contracts and funding is sought to carry out projects within Pilling Pilling Parish Councillors live within our parish and are mindful of their and other residents rise in the cost of living, with consideration to all our residents the Parish Precept has made a minimal increase of 17 pence per week.

If your property is **Band D the** precept was £88.82 last year and will be about £88.99, an increase of £0.17 per household on last year's Pilling Parish Council's precept.

Councillor Eddie Moorat

Cllr. Eddie Moorat

Councillor Eddie Moorat was a unique individual in every sense of the word! Born in Belgium, he came to England just before the second World War and along with his family settled in Cumbria, only speaking French! Quickly learning English at Brampton Primary School.

He did his national service and then joined the Cumbia Police Service. Training to be a teacher he finished his education career as deputy head of Ashton Secondary School in Preston.

Eddie settled in Pilling in 1971, quickly becoming involved in village activities. He was an active member of St. Johns Church, served as a governor at St Johns School, worked on Jubilee celebrations, Pilling Coffee Feast and organised Celebrate Pilling amongst others. He had a singularly overview of local organisations and could facilitate their working together.

He became a Pilling Parish Councillor in 1999 soon becoming involved a very active member, always bringing useful contributions and debate to the Council and served as Vice-Chairman for a time.

His greatest contribution to Pilling was his 2020 vision which culminated in Pilling's New Village Hall, which is a real testament to his persistent diligence and hard work. His ability to apply and succeed in receiving funding for projects resulting in immeasurable benefit to Pilling was legendary. It was Eddie who masterminded our nine defibrillators and the two clothing collections, still generating funds.

I had the pleasure of working with him over the years – I will miss him, but have so many happy and treasured memories of working closely with him. The village has lost a great man and will be sorely missed, to his family my deepest sympathy.

Councillor John Barton

Cllr. John Barton

John was born and bred in Pilling, he attended St. Johns School and then St. Aidan's. Leaving school at 16 to join the family farming business, where he worked for the rest of his life. As a result; he developed a deep love and understanding of wildlife, birds and the countryside.

He led an active social life and as a member of the Country Landowners Association and Fylde Farmers he made contacts which proved useful when joining Pilling Parish Council in 2015.

During his terms of office John devoted much time and energy in dealing with matters relating to agriculture and flooding. Attending Wyre Flood Forum and Lancashire Association of Local Councils as an appointed representative of Pilling Parish Council and attended many meetings with Lancashire County Council, Wyre Council, Natural England and the Environment Agency to discuss issues relating to land drainage.

Despite being diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease in June 2021 John continued to attend Parish Council and committee meetings as an active member until November 2022, his knowledge proving a valuable source of information in Pilling.

John passed away on 12th December 2022 at home surrounded by his family.

John was proud to serve on Pilling Parish Council and brought knowledge in areas that rest of the council lacked; we will miss him for this and his calm reflective decision making.

Time: 1 hour Start and finish: Pilling Car Park

From the car park entrance, turn right and cross the road to the footpath on opposite side and walk past the front of the Pilling Pottery and the St John the Baptist Church.



- Continue along the footpath to junction of Fluke Hall Lane (Golden Ball Hotel).
- Turn left onto Fluke Hall Lane passing the village school and approx. 100 metres past the school, turn left at public footpath along farm track (Libby Lane). Go over the stile (or through farm gate) into field, keeping to the left hand side of the field.
- Go over the stile into the next field and turn sharp left. Follow the hedge side on the left hand side, along the boundary of the Glendale Caravan Park.
- When reaching the far side of the field, go over the footbridge into the next field and follow the hedgerow on the right to the gate.
- Go through this gate into a small paddock, then through the next gate onto the footpath.
- Turn left and follow the footpath back to the car park in Pilling Village.

You can also divert through the Church Grounds at the start of the route, to add some historical interest to the Walk. The original Church was built in 1717 and is occasionally open to the Public.

Elections 4th May, 2023

Wyre Council and Parish Council Elections

The UK Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Get help with electoral registration

Send your postal and proxy vote applications to your local electoral registration team. You can also contact them to find out if you're on the electoral register, and if you already have a postal or proxy vote.

You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable.

You can use any of the following:

- Passport (this can be used even if it's out of date, as long as the photo looks like you)
- · Driving licence (including provisional licence)
- · Blue badge
- · Certain concessionary travel cards
- · Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- · Biometric Immigration document
- · Defence identity card
- · Certain national identity cards

You will only need to show one form of photo ID. It needs to be the original version and not a photocopy or photograph.

If you are not registered to vote, you will need to register by Monday 17 April to vote in these elections. Register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. If you're not sure if you're registered to vote, call Electoral Services on 01253 887236 to check.

Pilling Parish Council has two vacancies in the Office of Parish Councillor and is hoping to fill those seats at this election. The Council is seeking residents to become councillors. Councillors are not employees; they are elected or co-opted representatives who volunteer their time for free to work on behalf of their communities. As a Councillor you will engage with the local community and keep up to date with issues of local concern, provide a voice for all sections of the community, mediate between individuals and organisations, campaigning on behalf of the Parish Council and residents and manage public funds, whilst seeking best value. There is a legal requirement to attend Parish Council meetings and abide by the Code of Conduct.

Safer Roads Fund A588



The Safer Roads Fund was established by the Department for Transport in 2016 to improve safety on England's 50 most dangerous A-roads.

Lancashire County Council made a successful bid for £1.9m for the A588 from Lancaster's Pointer roundabout to Skippool identified as a 'high risk' route – including average speed cameras over 26km, and measures to highlight the centreline and edge of the road, and cycle safety measures at the Pointer Roundabout. Started in November the work is due to complete by April 2023

Average speed cameras work by reading the number plate of passing vehicles and calculating a driver's average speed over a known length of road within the same speed limit. This results in drivers maintaining a steady average speed rather than just slowing down when they see a traditional fixed or spot speed camera, delivering safer and smoother traffic flows. Previous cameras installed in 2017 have seen a reduction in collisions of up to 86% on these routes.
